Book 1: The three sounds of the suffix 'ed'

The suffix 'ed' is added to the end of verbs to show that an action has happened in the past. For example: the verb 'walk' in the past tense is 'walked'.

The suffix 'ed' can spell three sounds: NV as in the word jumped'

/d/ as in the word 'longed'

Ad as in the word 'wanted'

Despite sounding three different ways, the suffix 'ed' is always spelled 'ed'.
